What do we dream of for children as they prepare for the sacraments? On the following pages, we'll indicate some signs of basic readiness to look for and pray for, along with ideas about how children can grow and deepen their faith.

OPENNESS TO GRACE

- the blessing of a personal prayer life
- a desire and appreciation for receiving Jesus in the Eucharist
- an orientation towards doing what's right

A relationship with Jesus is a blessing and a grace! Through our witness and our prayers, we can work with God to foster the blessings of faith in the lives of our children.

KNOWLEDGE OF OUR FAITH

- becoming familiar with the Word of God
- understanding the power of the sacraments
- enjoying traditions of Catholic prayer and worship

Knowledge of our faith is a treasure that can be passed from person to person. Our Catholic tradition is rich with stories, rituals, and language that we can learn about and share, to help one another grow and come closer to God.

A personal prayer life

What can parents do?

Welcome Jesus into your home through family prayer routines, such as a morning blessing, grace at meals, bedtime prayer, a family prayer corner, worship music in the car.

Nurture a personal prayer life of your own, and let your children see you praying.

What might this look like for your child?

Forming

- Thinks of prayer as a conversation with Jesus, a way of being friends
- Has a positive and respectful attitude towards prayer and is open to praying
- Wants to come closer to God

GROWING

- Truly enjoys spending time in prayer
- Has some favorite personal prayers or Scripture passages
- Initiates prayer with others and likes to support them in prayer

DEEPENING

• Enjoys creating prayers, praying with music, looking for inspiration from saints and other guides.

Catholic Worship

What can parents do?

Practice the sign of the cross from an early age, for example, by tracing it on your child's forehead as a bedtime blessing.

Get your child a children's missal so they can follow along during mass.

Spend some time yourself learning about the richness of Catholic worship; for example, join a course or study group, learn about saints and their special roles and charisms.

KNOWLEDGE



What might this look like for your child?

- Knows the sign of the cross, how to genuflect, and that "Amen" means "yes"
- Shows reverence at mass, puts effort into focusing
- Understands that the mass is a form of prayer that we (the church) do together
- Is familiar with some of the prayers and songs we share at mass
- Knows the Lord's Prayer (Our Father) by heart
- Understands the basic pattern of the mass
- Enjoys a variety of prayer types, such as praise (thank you), petition (help me), contrition (I'm sorry) DFFPFNING
- Can select scripture passages or songs for prayer
- Is familiar with the rosary and other traditional prayers

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A desire for the Eucharist

What can parents do?

Talk to your kids about receiving Jesus. Let them see that Communion matters to you.

If you receive communion, enjoy some time in prayer when you return to your pew.

Explore the church building, looking more closely at the objects and places in the church, considering how they point us towards God.

What might this look like for your child?

• Knows that Jesus is present in the Eucharist. It is not ordinary bread and wine.

FORMING

- Understands the Last Supper as the place where Jesus gave this gift of his whole self to us
- Knows how to receive the Eucharist respectfully

GROWING

- Worships and participates enthusiastically by reading along, standing, sitting, kneeling at the appropriate times
- Recognizes liturgical items used in the mass and how they help us worship

DEEPENING

- Recognizes the prayers and actions that accomplish the consecration.
- Wants to be involved in a ministry such as altar servers

KNOWLEDGE

What might this look like for your child?

- Knows the sacraments of Baptism, Eucharist, and Reconciliation and can tell what God is doing in each
- Recognizes that we have a part active not passive in receiving a sacrament
- Recognizes the importance of the forgiveness of sins (at Mass and Confession) before receiving Communion
- Knows all seven sacraments and the gifts they provide
- Attends a baptism, and perhaps other sacraments, recognizing the signs and prayers



GROWING

- Can witness to others about their experience of the sacraments
- Can look ahead to future sacraments
- Understands that after baptism, sacraments help them take responsibility for their own relationship with God

A desire to do what's right

What can parents do?

Use the language of conscience, listening for the voice of God in us -- "What would Jesus do?"

Share times when you pray over a difficult decision.

Show children how to own one's behavior, and how to apologize.

Make a habit of going to Reconciliation. Let your kids know this matters to you.

What might this look like for your child?

• Recognizes that sin separates us from God

Forming

- Knows the difference between a sin and an accident
- Knows that Confession is a chance to apologize to God and receive forgiveness
- Seeks Jesus' help in avoiding sin and doing good

• Recognizes how their actions affect others around them

- Has a desire to act with mercy and kindness
- Welcomes Reconciliation as an ongoing support for living a Christian life

• Takes leadership and initiative in helping others by speaking up about things that are wrong and taking actions to make things better.

The Word of God

What can parents do?

Have a family Bible in your house in a special place, and look through it from time to time with your child, even before they can read it on their own.

Read picture books and show videos of Bible stories to your kids.

Support your child's participation in church, and have discussions after mass about the Sunday readings.

KNOWLEDGE



What might this look like for your child?

- Understands that the Bible is God's word, a precious gift to us so we can know Him better
- Recognizes the Great Commandment, to love the Lord with all your heart, and to love your neighbor as yourself
- Is familiar with the Ten Commandments and the Beatitudes
- Can name the four gospels and maybe other parts of the Bible
- Has some favorite parts of the Bible that help them to know Jesus better
- Wants to explore the Bible for insight and guidance, an aid to prayer
- Understands the chapter and verse structure so they can find readings and important verses

SESSION TOPICS



2

We can welcome Jesus as a friend into our lives. He has known us always, and he wants to share in our lives. We can find him in silence, in stillness, in listening, and in pondering his words.

PRAYER

We know God the Father as the Creator. He offers us a "kingdom" and invites us to discover its mysterious power and its tremendous value. All of God's works are gifts to us. We express our relationship with God in the "Our Father" prayer.

GOD THE FATHER

3

Jesus was a real person who lived in a specific place at a particular time. Yet he also told and showed us that he was more than just an ordinary person, that he was God's son, the Messiah, who came into the world so he could be close to us and help us to know and come closer to God. Jesus is "The Good Shepherd" who calls his own sheep by name and lays down his life for them.

JESUS

4

Through sacraments, we encounter by sight and touch certain signs that point us to the rich gifts that God is offering us. In Baptism, the first sacrament, we are called by name to join the community around Jesus called the church.

BAPTISM

5

In the Eucharist, Jesus gives his whole self to us. He told his friends at the Last Supper that the Bread and the Wine are himself. This gift of Jesus' risen life happens every time the Mass is celebrated, right up to the present time.

EUCHARIST

Jesus calls us to turn towards him, to listen to his voice. When we turn away, we are separated from his love and friendship. The choices we make that separate us from God are called sins. The Sacrament of Reconciliation provides us with the gift of grace - God's life within us - because God offers mercy and forgiveness, and he welcomes us back with great joy.

RECONCILIATION

The church building is the prayer space for the community. In it, we celebrate the mass together. The mass includes language, objects, and gestures that help us to know God.

(This week's activities include a teaching mass and a tour of the church.)
