Is your child ready for sacrament prep?

GET READY: Warmup Requirements

First, enjoy the habit of attending mass regularly. To help your child feel connected to the church community, have them come to Catch the Wave and/or the Good Shepherd Atrium for at least a year (20 sessions). (Hey, why not do both?)

GET SET

Once your child is in Grade 3 or older and has participated in Catch the Wave and/or the Atrium for a year, a member of the KidsMin team will reach out and invite you to enroll in an intensive 9 week session in either fall or spring.

GO!

Your child will attend 9 weeks of prep sessions, accompanied in a small group by two adult guides. At the end of that time, they'll go to Confession on a Saturday afternoon and celebrate First Communion at a regular Sunday mass.

The preparation process

Imagine if every child was being prayed for by name. Imagine if each one could be known, genuinely cared for, and could discuss and explore their faith with a trusted guide.

This culture of intentional accompaniment is how St. Ignatius encourages ongoing, authentic connection and spiritual growth. Preparing for the sacraments is an important step in the discipleship process for kids.

Every week for 9 weeks, a small group of 4-6 children will meet with a team of two adults. They'll enjoy each other's company, receive a lesson, and share their thoughts. They'll respond prayerfully with art, music, or journals. The adult guides will pray and listen, accompanying them on this step in their faith journey.

SESSION TOPICS



PRAYER

We can welcome Jesus as a friend into our lives. He has known us always, and he wants to be close to us. We can find him in silence, in stillness, in listening, and in pondering his words.

THE CHURCH

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The church building is the prayer space for the community. The mass includes language, objects, and actions that help us to know and worship God.

GOD THE FATHER

God the Father, the Creator, offers us a "kingdom" and invites us to discover its mysterious power and its tremendous value. We express our love and gratitude in the "Our Father" prayer.

JESUS

Jesus walked the earth long ago, teaching and caring for people. What's more, he is STILL living, God's son, the Messiah, the "Good Shepherd" who calls his sheep by name and offers his whole self in the Eucharist.

BAPTISM

In the sacraments, we see and touch certain signs that point us to the rich gifts of God. Baptism is the first sacrament, when we are called by name to join the church.

EUCHARIST

In the Eucharist, Jesus gives his whole self to us in the form of bread and wine. This gift of Jesus' risen life happens every time the Mass is celebrated, right up to the present time.

RECONCILIATION

Jesus calls us to turn towards him, to listen to his voice. When we sin, we turn away from Jesus, separated from his love and friendship. In the Sacrament of Reconciliation, God welcomes us back with joy.


How to use this handbook

What do we dream of for children as they prepare for the sacraments? This booklet suggests some signs of basic readiness to look for, along with ideas about how children can grow and deepen their faith both during and after the prep classes.

STARTING OUT explains the basic expectations for receiving the sacraments. We'll work on these in the group sessions.

STEPPING UP suggests some "next steps" to consider.

LEADING gives some indicators for kids who are strong in their faith and eager for more.

FRIENDSHIP WITH JESUS

What can parents do?


Welcome Jesus into your family's daily routines: a morning blessing, grace at meals, bedtime prayer, a family prayer corner, worship music in the car, dancing in the kitchen, whatever feels right!

Nurture a personal prayer life of your own, and let your children see you praying. (Need help? Invest time in Alpha!)

Have a family Bible in your house in a special place. Read picture books and show videos of Bible stories to your kids.

Talk to your kids about receiving Jesus at mass. Enjoy some time in prayer when you return to your pew after Communion.

What might this look like for your child?



LEADING

- · Curious to explore the Bible more
- Can support others, perhaps by selecting scripture or songs for community prayer
- Enjoys a variety of prayer types, such as praise, petition, contrition

STEPPING UP

- Truly enjoys spending time in prayer
- Has some favorite Bible passages, songs, or stories
- Prays for others as well as for themselves
- · Creates art, music, or poetry to pray with

STARTING OUT

- Shows openness to praying
- Thinks of prayer as a conversation with Jesus
- Understands that the Bible is God's word, a precious gift so we can know Him better

The Church **KNOWING OUR FAITH**

What can parents do?

From an early age, trace the sign of the cross on your child's forehead as a bedtime blessing.


Get a children's guide to the mass (missal) so they can follow along.

Spend some time yourself learning about the richness of Catholicism; for example, find an app or podcast, join a course or study group.

Talk after mass about the Sunday readings and Catch the Wave.

Explore the church building, looking at objects and artwork. How do they point us towards God? Genuflect towards the tabernacle as a sign of reverence and respect.

What might this look like for your child?



LEADING

- Participates enthusiastically at mass, and might take on a role such as altar server
- Can witness to others about their experience of the sacraments
- Helps others to enjoy their experience in the church by volunteering and welcoming them



STEPPING UP

- Understands the Last Supper as the place where Jesus gave his whole self to us
- · Knows the Our Father by heart
- Understands the basic pattern of the mass and follows along with words and actions



STARTING OUT

- Knows the sign of the cross, how to genuflect, and that "Amen" means "yes"
- Puts effort into focusing at mass
- Knows that Jesus is present in the bread and wine

Being a Christian WALKING WITH GOD

What can parents do?

Use the language of conscience -- "What would Jesus do?"


Share times when you pray over a difficult decision.

Show children how to own one's behavior, how to apologize, and how to look for opportunities to show kindness and care for people who are hurting.

Make a habit of going to Confession. Let your kids know this matters.

Share photos and stories of your own experiences of the sacraments, and bring your kids to baptisms, weddings, funerals. Express encouragement towards religious vocations and the sacrament of marriage.

What might this look like for your child?



LEADING

- · Asks for Confession when they know they need it
- Takes initiative by offering to help, speaking up about things that are wrong, and taking actions to make things better
- Gets involved in community service or care-giving projects

STEPPING UP

- Genuinely seeks Jesus' help in doing good and avoiding sin
- Shows empathy and recognizes how their actions affect others
- Is familiar with moral guidance such as the Ten Commandments and the Beatitudes

STARTING OUT

- Recognizes that sin separates us from God and that confession heals that separation
- Knows the difference between a sin and an accident
- Recognizes the Great Commandment (Matthew 22:34-40)
